Autism is a neurodevelopmental condition of variable severity where children find it difficult to communicate and interact socially, some of them have restricted or repetitive patterns of thought and behaviour. It's a life long condition and the children have learning difficulties. Some of our children fall into this spectrum.

On April 26, 2024, the Mental Health Team hosted an inspiring Autism Awareness Mela at DMRC CHB to celebrate World Autism Awareness Month. Thirty-three children with special needs from various centres participated in running, sack race, sensory activities, tattoo making, drum circles, and a talent show featuring their singing, dancing, and musical talents.

The event was a celebration of the children's unique abilities, supported by older children and staff from DMRC and Aarushi. It was a day filled with smiles, laughter, and newfound confidence, highlighting our community's acceptance and inclusion of these very special children.



KICKBOXING

RESCUE

The outreach workers manning the help desk at Old Delhi Railway Station rescued an abandoned infant baby girl of about 3-4 months from a platform. The team made several public announcements at the station but no one came to claim the baby. As per protocol the team filed a report at the police station. Meanwhile, the crying infant was soothed, fed, cleaned and made comfortable, and after protracted requests via video calls with the Child Welfare Committee's Chairperson, the baby was placed in a protective environment (PALNA HOME). The baby is now in safe hands where the team nurtures her.



WORKSHOPS



We conducted a workshop on Non-Formal Education (NFE). Non-formal education is central to learning and then joining formal school. as Many of our children come from places where they have never been to school, to place them in age appropriate classes they need to go through a bridge course and are started on the journey via NFE. The central topic, covering definition, importance, methodologies, and benefits of NFE were discussed. Teachers also prepared Teaching-Learning Materials (TLM) and engaged in role-playing related to their classroom activities. The workshop was highly effective and enjoyable for all the teachers involved. It was also an opportunity to celebrate the birthdays of our staff - Zainab and Samar.



A five day long teacher's training program was attended by our teachers. It was conducted by Kee Education Foundation with the support of Children's Hope India (CHI). This training was about Early Childhood Education for 3-6 years old children.

Mrs. Indira, Trustee of CHI also took two hours session on Emotional intelligence.

HEALTH CAMP



The Asian Medical Students Association organized a health camp at the Salaam Baalak Trust's Kishalaya Centre. During the camp, medical check-ups were conducted for 80 children and 20 adults. Those with more serious conditions were referred to hospitals for further treatment.



A session on Menstrual Health & Hygiene was organised at the Seelampur center by a team of doctors. Hygiene kits were distributed by the doctors. A total of 150 ladies and girls were benefited.

SBT Children Excel at Edumedha JIMS Annual Talent Hunt

Heartwarming Reunion After 22 Years: Ravi Alias Amit Reunites with His Family

This could have been a scene straight out of the movies! In a remarkable twist of fate, 27-year-old Ravi Alias Amit was reunited with his family after 22 years, thanks to the tireless efforts of various organizations and law enforcement officials. This extraordinary tale of hope and determination began when Ravi, then a five-year-old boy from a village near Bahadarpur, Muzaffarnagar, Uttar Pradesh, got lost while running an errand to a local store.

Ravi's unintended adventure led him to the Bahadarpur railway station, four kilometers away. Misunderstanding directions, he sought to reach his his maternal grandfather's house in Bala Chor near Kota Bus Stop in Saharanpur, Uttar Pradesh, but mistakenly boarded a train to Mumbai. For days, he survived by begging until a fellow traveller suggested he might find better opportunities in Delhi.

In Delhi, Ravi spent about six months around the Old Delhi Railway Station, finding some solace at a nearby Gurudwara that provided food. The open sky of the station served as his home until a senior officer, accompanied by the GRP and RPF, found him sleeping under the station stairs. Although he couldn't remember the name of his village, he recalled "Bahadarpur." This led to his referral to Child Line (1098) and subsequent placement under the care of the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) Alipur in 2003.

Recognizing Ravi's need for care and protection, the CWC transferred him to the Alipur Boys Government Home. Alipur Home enrolled him in the nearest government school in the 5th standard, but Ravi struggled to adapt and eventually ran away, now finding himself at New Delhi Railway Station.

For the next year and a half, Ravi survived as a ragpicker until staff from Prayas Sanstha discovered him in a miserable condition and took him in. A month later, he was transferred to Aasra, a shelter home run by us. Ravi found a stable environment, studied hard and once he turned 18, we helped him find a job and boarding facilities

Through all these years Ravi did not give up his search for his home and family. Using the internet and providing clues to visiting policemen, he actively searched for his origins. Although several attempts were made, his village remained elusive. But finally his persistence paid off when a senior inspector from Panchkula, Haryana, took an interest in his case. Over two months, the inspector meticulously worked through Ravi's memories, interlinking information across police stations in Uttar Pradesh. The breakthrough came when the search led to a family in Muzaffarnagar district whose elder son had been missing for years. Verification confirmed that this was indeed Ravi's family. After 22 long years, Ravi was finally reunited with his mother and family, a moment filled with overwhelming joy and emotion. The reunion garnered significant attention, with local news channels highlighting this extraordinary story.
